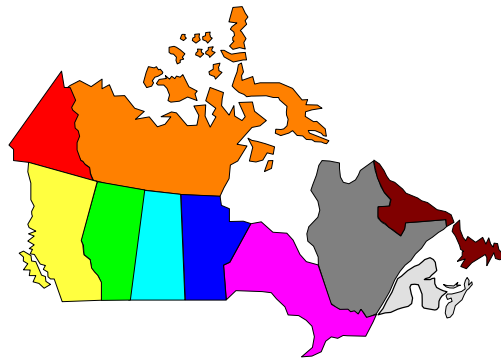




**CANADIAN CAMPSITES

General Information

Members of Scouts Canada enjoy the company of a large number of international Scouting visitors each year. Many of these arrive as groups and stay at one or more of our campsites. We hope the list below will assist potential visitors in choosing a location that is right for them while they are in Canada. To make sure everyone has a good time, there are a few national policy concerns, which international visitors need to know. All campers and visitors at Canadian Campsites are required to follow these policies.

1. Scouts Canada's Adults Screening Policy

All adults who work for Scouts Canada or who are registered members are required to undergo an extensive screening process to comply with our Child Protection Policies. Adults visiting from other countries are required to prove membership of their National Scout Associations with a national membership card as well as travel approval for the group from their National Association. Adults traveling with the group, who are approved helpers, will be required to sign a Scouts Canada "Individual Release and Hold Harmless" agreement on arrival at camp (see www.scouts.ca, click on "For Leaders", click on "Forms" and scroll down to the pdf document. We accept visitors from associations that are members of the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM).

2. Scouts Canada's Alcohol Policy

There shall be no alcohol or recreational drug/substance consumed or made available on any Scout Property...owned or leased. There shall be no alcohol or recreational drug/substance consumed or made available during any Program activity. "Program activities" include meetings, camps, hikes, training programs (Wood Badge, workshops, etc.), Scouters Conferences, "Scout Night" with sports teams and similar functions. No person shall consume alcohol or any other recreational drug/substance within a time frame, which would negatively affect their ability to carry out a duty of care. There shall be no exclusions of youth from any Scouting activity so alcohol or recreational drugs/substances may be consumed by adult members.

3. Insurance Requirement

Visiting groups who are not members of Scouts Canada will require proof of CAN\$2 million of liability coverage for activities in North America to stay at any Scouts Canada camp. "A Certificate of Insurance" from a National Scout Association will provide this proof. It is the responsibility of visiting leaders to ensure that they obtain this certificate for presentation when they arrive at camp. Scouts Canada strongly recommends that visiting groups be covered under (or obtain prior to leaving home) a Medical And Accident Insurance Plan that will cover them during their visit.

There may be additional conditions and local regulations associated with individual camps which will be advised when you book your accommodation.

Please contact the camps you are interested in using the contact information provided in the list for each province, region or camp. We also encourage you to visit the listed web sites for additional information about the camps and Scouting regions you are interested in.

The list is organized alphabetically by province. You might find it useful to have a map of Canada in front of you when you are planning your trip and possible camp locations.

Chinook Council offers a variety of outdoor programs for all sections at its camps. There are programs for every season including a 4-day winter camping adventure at Camp Impeesa in February.

Camp Apistotoke (located in the Cypress Hills 70 km south of Medicine Hat). Camp Apistotoke is year round, camp in Elkwater Provincial Park for Beavers, Cubs and Scouts., Canoeing, hiking, beach activities, downhill & cross country skiing are all available. Groups can use the park's interpretive programs too. This facility can house about 42 people in three heated cabins. Campsites are also available. Dining area seats 75. Shower and washrooms heated year round.

Camp Gardner (30 km. west of Calgary). A year round camp geared to Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. Camp Gardner offers an extensive nature program including interpretive centre. Family programs and theme weekends are also available. The camp has a swimming pool, obstacle course, archery range snowshoeing, skating and other program facilities Meals can be catered or cook your own. Tenting, cabins, bunkhouses, motel style accommodation,

Camp Impeesa (located on Beaver Mines Lake 36 km southwest of Pincher Creek). This three-season facility is geared to Scouts, Venturers, and Rovers. It offers high adventure activities like rock climbing, mountain biking, rappelling, spelunking, The camp also offers an obstacle course & zip line, archery, GPS geo-cache, and canoeing. There are tent sites, cabins, and a family program area.

Impeesa Extreme is a High Adventure program for Scouts, Venturers, Rovers and Extreme Adventure programs based at Camp Impeesa in the Southern Canadian Rockies from June 21 to August 31. It's filled with great adventures like caving, mountain biking, trekking high mountain ranges, rappelling down granite cliffs and fly-

fishing. We'll make sure that you're in for the best experience by sending one of our highly trained Trail Scouters with you.

Timber Trails is a Scout, Venturer, Rover & Extreme Adventure program based at the Rocky Mountains 250 km northwest of Calgary. Experience trail riding, exploring, hiking, fishing and much more.

Ernest Poole Scout Camp - (75 km west of Edmonton). This wilderness camp offers full time staff, use of flush toilets and showers, sailboats, boats and sports equipment with site rental. Some winterized facilities are available. Activities: Self-contained groups plan their own programs. Sail boating, canoeing, archery, hiking, family camping and cross-country skiing are popular on this site.

Skeleton Lake Scout Camp (160 km northeast of Edmonton). The camp features four kitchen/dining buildings. Bunkhouses accommodate up to 42 people each. Flush toilets, drinking water; two furnished cabins with bunk beds accommodating up to 10 people each; chapel; activity building; marquee; campfire circle; firewood; beaches; hiking trails and facilities for family camping. Some buildings are suitable for winter use. An extensive wilderness area is available. Program/supervisory staff May through September. Activities: Self-contained groups plan their own programs. Canoes, sailboats, kayaks, archery and field sports equipment are available. A golf course is adjacent to the camp.

Camp Woods (170 km. northwest of Calgary). Located less than 2 hours from both Banff and Jasper National parks this camp features four villages with year round lodges. Semi wilderness camping, family camping and some un-serviced RV lots on a 105-acre site. Enjoy the waterfront with sailboats and canoes. Obstacle course, orienteering, pioneering, rappelling, nature study and swimming are available on the site.

VANCOUVER ISLAND

Camp Barnard - Located around Young Lake, minutes from Sooke, BC and 27 km from Victoria. The camp has 300 acres of both wilderness and developed camping potential. Suitable for year round use. Contact the Camp Ranger at (250) 642-5924

Camp Caillet - located 15 minutes from Nanaimo close to Brannen Lake the camp has access to a hiking trail. Facilities include two sleep cabins, six tent shelters each accommodating six people, a group camping area, covered dining shelter seating 20 and a fully equipped kitchen. Running water is on site but no indoor washroom facilities. There are outhouses on site. Contact Jari Scott at (250) 756-3140.

Camp Gillwell - located in the Comox Valley just north of Courtenay along the banks of the Brown's River, close to Forbidden Plateau and Mount Washington - snowboarding, downhill and cross-country ski runs in winter, hiking and mountain bike trails in the summer. The facilities include four sleep cabins accommodating 48. An A-frame dining room with full kitchen facilities, seats 35 and has sleeping accommodation for three. All buildings have electricity. Outhouses are on site, no indoor washroom facilities. Contact Derek Amos at (250) 334-2623.

Camp Nassichuk - located along a creek 30 minutes south of Powell River on a logging road. Facilities include a dining pavilion with seating for 50; two propane and one wood cook stove, hot and cold running water. There is a washhouse with two washrooms. A total of ten sleeping shelters accommodate 4-6 people each. In addition there is a chapel site, campfire pit, sports field and tenting sites. Contact Janet Palen at (604) 485-7652.

Marble Bay Camp - located on lake Cowichan between Lake Cowichan Village and Youbou. This facility is a wilderness camp offering tenting sites and a cookhouse. Pumped water and outhouses are on site. The camp has access to hiking trails and canoes are available.

Camp Alloway (180 km. from Winnipeg). A 40.5 hectare wilderness site in the Big Whiteshell Provincial Park, normally accessible by user's own watercraft from mid-May to mid-October, by snow vehicles, skis, snowshoes or foot across the lake (about 3 km) during freeze-up (normally mid-December to mid-March), or by hiking around Big Whiteshell Lake (about 15 km over rough trail). Aside from a large boathouse for equipment storage and emergency shelter, eight canoes with paddles and life jackets (stored in the boat-house), and one outhouse, there are no facilities. Water is taken from the lake and treated. Suitable for experienced Scouts, Venturers and Rovers only.

Camp Amisk (5 km south of Winnipeg). On the La Salle River, includes five bush and six field campsites suitable for groups of all sizes for tent camping. Fire pits and outhouses are provided. Drinking water is available only in spring, summer and fall. There are two buildings on site, a doughnut shelter with fire ring and a storage shed (containing tables, benches and some program equipment). Two kitchen shelters and an emergency telephone are available.

Delta Beach (24 km. north of Portage La Prairie) located on the south shore of Lake Manitoba. Facilities include a fully-contained, winterized, rustic cabin suitable for the use of all sections, year-round. There is an internal holding tank, which supplies drinking water for the kitchen sink and the washrooms with flush toilet and basin. Lake water is safe for swimming, laundry and dishes. There are three small rooms with one bunk

(two beds) each, and 5 bunks (10 beds) in a larger room (also suitable for a craft/games area), for a total sleeping capacity of 16 (though more can be slept on the floor of the larger room). The kitchen/dining area contains a freezer, two fridges, and a built-in oven and 4-element stove, plus tables and chairs/benches. There are also currently two marked tenting sites, an outhouse and a fire ring.

George Lake (12 km. south east of Pointe du Bois). A 60 hectare wilderness campsite on George

Lake in the Whiteshell Provincial Park and accessible only by boat or canoe down the Winnipeg River followed by a 4 km. portage into camp. A single, uninsulated cabin is on-site containing a fireplace, cook stove, some cooking equipment and bunk bed frames that provides sleeping accommodation for 15-20 people. A pit-type outhouse is provided. Drinking water is taken from George Lake. Mainly Scouts, Venturers and Rover use this camp.

Camp Ashanti: Located on Route 460 at Black Duck near Stephenville and the Port aux Port Peninsula. The camp has electrical power and several cabins, a cookhouse and tenting sites. This is a local group site and no programs are provided. The camp is about three hours from the ferry at Port aux Basques. Contact the Council Office for details.

Camp Hancock: Located near Square Pond Park, about 25 minutes east of Gander, 200 meters of the Trans Canada Highway. This site offers a modern cookhouse and separate sleeping facilities, there is electrical power on site. For more information visit the council web site, click on Campsites and then Camp Hancock.

Camp Norwest: Located on North West Pond on the Eastern Boundary of Terra Nova National Park, 6.8 km off the Trans Canada Highway. This wilderness site has excellent waterfront facilities for canoeing and swimming and lots of interesting program opportunities for campers. The camp has been the home of the last two provincial jamborees and numerous Cuborees and other camps. Then site is operated as a summer facility from late May to Labour Day.

St John's Area: A number of groups have campgrounds within half an hour of the city. If you are planning a visit, the Council Office can link you up with a variety of Scouting facilities offering very limited conveniences.

Carol Scout Lodge, Labrador City: Located in the heart of Labrador City this lodge consists of a large auditorium and kitchen. It is ideal for a stopover as you wind your way along Route 500 in Labrador. Contact information is available through the Council Office.

Camp Nedooae: The Provincial Training Camp is located on 225 acres of wooded and open field property ca. 100 km from Halifax. Accommodation is available in cabins sleeping approx. 40

people. The camp borders on a fresh water lake suitable for swimming and other water activities. The dining hall seats approx. 40, washrooms are attached. The provincial campsite can be made available to visitors, but there are very limited support services and campers are basically on their own.

Camp Everton (40 km. from Kitchener). A 74 ha camp located on the Eramosa River near Guelph, open all year, six cabins accommodating up to 30 youth, 200 tenting sites and 5 Adirondack shelters. Wheeler Lodge accommodates up to 120 Wolf Cubs and Leaders. We offer a swimming pool, sports equipment and more. Close to Toronto area tourist attractions (1½ hours drive).

Camp Manitou – (15 km north of Burlington/45 minutes from downtown Toronto). This year round 100 acre camp located just off the Bruce Trail near Campbellville contains many campsites and some year round buildings and shelters in a mixture of wooded and open areas. The camp has easy access to many conservation areas offering skiing, mountain biking, swimming and miles of trail. This is an excellent location for groups visiting Toronto. Advance reservations are required.

Camp Wildman located on the south side of 8th Concession Road of Tiny Township. The camp has three lodges capable of accommodating 42, 24 and 9 people (in separate bunks) respectively. All lodges have electricity and the largest has hot and cold running water year round.. The 24 bunk lodge has hot and cold running water during the summer months only. All lodges are equipped with electric stoves and refrigerators. In addition, the two large lodges offer clothes dryers and electric heating. Other accommodation facilities include four 3-sided shelters with 12 bunks each. Outside camping areas accommodate more than three hundred in groomed and wilderness areas. Goodyear Memorial Scout Camp (60 km north of Mississauga). This year-round 260 acre camp, located on the rim of the scenic Hockley Valley near Orangeville, contains many campsites and some year round buildings and shelters in a mixture of wooded and open areas. The Bruce Trail passes within one km of the camp. Goodyear provides an excellent location for groups visiting

Toronto (1½ hrs from downtown), reservations required.

Haliburton Scout Reserve (3 hours drive from downtown Toronto). Consisting of 5,000 acres, this is the largest Scout camp in Canada, located in the popular vacation area of Central Ontario. Contains a large lake with typical rocky shores of the Cambrian Shield along with heavy forest and abundant wildlife. Numerous campsites accessible by water are available as well as many program support facilities and resources for visiting groups.

Woodland Trails Camp (45 minute drive from downtown Toronto). This 200 acres camp near Aurora contains many campsites and year-round buildings as well as an excellent Conference Centre. Composite summer camp programs are provided for Cub age youth. This is an excellent overnight location while visiting the Toronto area.

Camp Cedarwin (Approximately 40 km. from Windsor near Kingsville). A 74 acre camp situated in one of a few remaining Carolinian forests in Canada by Lake Erie. The site offers three self-contained year-round cabins for 24 youth each with kitchen, washrooms and dining area. Canoes available, tent patrol camping areas scattered throughout the property.

Camp Sylvan (45-minute drive northwest of London). This 270 ha camp near Sylvan contains numerous patrol and troop campsites plus three year-round self-contained cabin facilities and several theme sites. The property is noted for a wide variety of trees and several unique species for nature study.

Camp Wetaskiwin - This campsite offers easy access to Niagara Falls, Ontario (20 minute drive). Accommodations range from lodges to camping sites. Indoor washrooms are available. Other

facilities include running water, covered cooking/eating areas and campfire sites. Your group can enjoy obstacle courses, nature and hiking trails (on the Bruce Trail), wilderness bush, pioneering, swimming and a range of winter activities at this location.

Mount Nemo Camp (20 minutes from Hamilton; 30 minutes from Toronto). A 165-acre camp located midway between the QEW and 401 Highways in North Burlington. The camp is situated on Bronte Creek, a ¼-mile hike by road from the Bruce Trail. The camp has numerous tent sites and year-round cabins. Access to rock climbing on the Niagara Escarpment at Mount Nemo and Rattlesnake Point.

Spencer Park - London. This 12 ha camp is located in the city along the banks of the Thames River with numerous tent campsites and a year-round cabin facility for 48 campers (30 in winter). This is an ideal camp while visiting the Forest City.

Camp Jackson Dodds (105 km northeast of Montreal). Located in the Laurentians on Lac Cloutier, near Rawdon. Summer Camp fully staffed for group/and or composite campers of Cub age, offering waterfront program. Sleeping accommodations are comprised of 6 person tents on platforms with beds and mattresses. Other facilities include kitchen, dining room, recreation hall, infirmary, flush toilets and running water. Total capacity: 120 people. Fall, winter and spring accommodations are available in a winterized lodge with cooking facilities, dining area, fireplace and indoor washrooms. Many campsites are available and over 30 buildings that include a winterized "Longhouse", 8 cabins, 6 cabooses and a lodge. Facilities can accommodate over 170. Rentals are available for canoes, snowshoes and cross-country skis. Full staff supported summer program including sailing, canoeing, kayaking, ecology, and archery. Composite camp program available for Scout/Venturer age youth.

Anglin Lake Semi-Wilderness Camp - Located 40 minutes north of Prince Albert on Highway 2. The camp features a variety of tent campsites, boats, archery and rifle ranges and an obstacle course. There is a service corps to run program on site (week-end from May 20 to June 26 and full time June 27 to September 5). Drinking water, flush toilets (May 20 to September 5), firewood and garbage collection are provided.

Camp Gilwell - Located north of Regina on the shore of Mission Lake on Highway 56, the 40-acre camp offers opportunities for all camping and outdoor activities. The north section of the camp is mostly undeveloped and a good area for practicing no-trace camping. Fresh water, wheelchair accessible "biffies" with electricity, a 1000 square foot stone lodge with a fireplace, a natural gas furnace, stoves, fridges, sinks and a clothes drier.

The bunkhouse has 500 square feet of space and privacy area for a leader. Equipped with natural gas heating and electricity.

Camp Seonee - This rustic campsite is located at the north end of Pike Lake Provincial Camp about 30 km south of Saskatoon. There are three villages, two with dining hall/kitchen buildings and electricity as well as heated cabins sleeping 24 on bunk beds. The third is an all purpose heated building with 18 bunks and an outdoor kitchen. There are several tent sites with fire rings available for group use. Pit toilets are located throughout the camp and treated water is available at the on-site pump house. Wild life is abundant. Water channels are suitable for boating -- swimming is not advised. There is a service corps to run program on site weekends from May 20 to June 26 and full time from June 27 to September 5.
