# ACROSS THE COUNTY AND BACK AGAIN! 2020 WILDERNESS RENDEZVOUS HIKING CHALLENGE

### Wilderness Rendevzous Hiking Challenge



This summer, over 500 Scouts, Scouters and their families hiked over 12,500 km as part of the Wilderness Rendezvous (WR) Hiking Challenge. This total represents the distance from St. John's, Newfoundland to Victoria, British Columbia and almost back again! The WR Hiking Challenge was created when the Saskatchewan Council's WR Scout Camp staff decided to cancel their annual camp due to COVID-19.



Instead, Scouter Paul Ellerman proposed, "If we can't hike in the hills of Cypress Hills Provincial Park, then our youth and their families could hike and explore wherever they live."

The idea quickly evolved into the WR Hiking Challenge in which Scouts — from Beavers to Rovers, Scouters and their families — were challenged to hike 25 km



over the summer. The hikes took place across Canada, in urban and rural settings on beaches, forests, grasslands, badlands, and mountains.

Thanks to the efforts of Scouters Paul Ellerman, Garry Brown, Rob Ewert, and Penelope Ulmer, many Scouts and their families explored new places and spent time together as a family.





### **Gryphon Legion**

The Gryphon Legion Venturers leveled up their journey this year by embarking on a cave experience. After hiking 10 km, they braved the underground and chilly fall weather for an unbelievable spelunking adventure.



Rovers and Venturers from Northern Lights and Chinook Council took part in an epic ice climbing adventure in Nordegg, Alberta. 13 youth went hiking and scaled three different levels of ice walls. The weather was perfect — a balmy -10°C and sunshine! Everyone had an amazing time, learned new skills, and made new friends.

### A new vision for camps

Scouts Canada has embarked on an exciting project to create a new vision for our camps across Canada. The initiative launched in May and generated a lot of buzz in the Scouting community — which is great!

Throughout Scouts Canada's history, properties have played a crucial role in supporting Scouts' adventures, providing access to pristine wilderness and program infrastructure that wouldn't have been available otherwise — and we want to ensure that remains the case for Canadian youth in the 21st century.

Currently, Scouts Canada's property portfolio is not sustainable. To meet member and parent expectations, our portfolio is in need of drastic updates to its infrastructure to follow modern safety requirements and provide members with clean, functional facilities.


Scouts Canada has the opportunity to think big, without constraints or limitations, and to define a collective vision for our camps that sets a new standard for dynamic outdoor adventures and experiences.

Members, parents and other stakeholders were invited to participate in a survey to provide their initial thoughts on Scouts

Canada's camps, and how they could be improved. Close to 5,000 stakeholders responded to the survey and provided great insight into what Sections are looking for in a camping adventure.

To keep everyone up to date on the project, its associated resources and engagement results, a webpage has been created.

The Vision for SC Camps project will continue through 2021, engaging members and other stakeholders through focus groups and surveys, gaining a better understanding of each Section's unique needs.



# SCOUTING COMMUNITY



Our youth would not have been able to continue Scouting through spring and summer if it were not for our Scouters, who went above and beyond to provide a meaningful virtual experience.



# THE RETURN TO SCOUTING

We are extremely proud of the resilience and commitment of our youth, volunteers and staff as we navigated the pandemic and mapped a path forward to resume in-person Scouting. As we return to Scouting, safety is our top priority. At the onset of the pandemic, we were quick to shift programming to virtual out of an abundance of caution to ensure the health and well-being of our community. Since then we have reviewed government protocols and spoken to our members to guide the development of standards that will keep youth, parents and volunteers safe. As a result we have developed a step-by-step approach to the return to Scouting that aligns with direction from federal and provincial governments.

#### **Scouts Seeds**



This spring, Scouts Canada piloted a new spring fundraiser called Scout Seeds, which aimed to support Scouts in their home communities while also helping the planet!

The Scout Seeds pilot fundraiser ran from March 30 to April 30, 2020, in partnership with Make It Sow. This fundraiser was designed to complement our national Scout Popcorn campaign, which takes place each fall and funds Groups to support more great, safe Scouting adventures.

- Almost \$50,000 raised
- 270 trees will be planted in 2021 on behalf of participating Groups as part of "Make it Sow's Plant a Tree" bonus

### **Scouts Popcorn**

Simply put — great adventures start with Scout Popcorn. Groups and individual youth across Canada benefited from funds raised through Scout Popcorn, powering more adventures and once-in-a-lifetime experiences.

Fundraising with Scout Popcorn is youthled and helps youth be better prepared

for success in the world! In addition to raising money, youth develop valuable business skills and learn about financial responsibility, marketing strategy development and time management, while also increasing their self-esteem and confidence in the process.

### **PLAY SAFE**

As safety leaders in Canada, Scouts Canada and Hydro One teamed up in 2019-2020 to extend their culture of safety through a Head Safe and Emergency Ready Program.



#### **HEAD SAFE PROGRAM**

Safety awareness and prevention are not limited to the playing field or workplace — safe living begins at home.

Through the program, youth learned head injury first aid, role play on how to respond to real-life scenarios, and gained understanding of key preventative measures and the necessary steps toward recovery before a safe return to play.

- Over 34,000 Scouts Canada members reached
- 5 community events
- 82% reported an increased knowledge of head safety.
- 94% of Groups implemented or plan to implement Head Safe programming
- In showcasing the importance of head safety to communities across the country, media relations garnered 40 million impressions

### SCOUTS CANADA'S SAFE SCOUTING TEAM

Safe Scouting continues to support our members and the youth they serve in providing safe spaces for youth. Whether it is checking in to see how an injured person is progressing in their recovery, providing support to Scouters in need of assistance or working to keep our Scouting youth safe, the Safe Scouting team helps deliver support to volunteers to make our activities safer.

As part of our safety culture, we continuously look to improve our policies to provide a safe environment for Scouting. 2019-2020 saw Scouts Canada expand volunteer screening to include child abuse registries where they exist in Manitoba and Nova Scotia. Scouts Canada is committed to using all resources to help us make informed decisions for our screening measures.

### REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITOR ON THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The accompanying summary financial statements of Scouts Canada National Operation, which comprise the summary statement of financial position as at August 31, 2020, and the summary statement of operations and changes in fund balances for the year then ended, and related notes, are derived from the audited financial statements prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, of Scouts Canada National Operation as at August 31, 2020, and for the year then ended.

### NOTES TO THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### August 31, 2020

#### 1. ORGANIZATION

Scouts Canada National Operation (the "National Operation") is a national organization operating programs aimed at contributing to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potential as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities through the application of Scouts Principles and Practices.

The National Operation is a registered charity and is responsible for the national activities of Scouts Canada and provides services to the Councils of the National Operation.

### 2. SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The summary financial statements are derived from the complete audited financial statements, prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, as at August 31, 2020 and for the year then ended.

The preparation of these summary financial statements requires Management to determine the information that needs to be reflected in the summary financial statements so that they are consistent, in all material respects, with or represent a fair summary of the audited financial statements.

These summarized financial statements have been prepared by Management using the following criteria:

- (a) whether information in the summary financial statements is in agreement with the related information in the complete audited financial statements; and
- (b) whether, in all material respects, the summary financial statements contain the information necessary to avoid distorting or obscuring matters disclosed in the related complete audited financial statements, including the notes thereto.

Management determined that the statement of cash flows do not provide additional useful information and as such has not included it as part of the summary financial statements.
