What an amazing year 2013-2014 has turned out to be! We have experienced many positive changes and new developments over the year and I am proud to say that I was able to take part in it as the Council Youth Commissioner Scouting!

Over this scouting year we have shared in many exciting and memorable moments such as the Scouts Canada National Leadership Summit, the role out of "The Canadian Path" to hosting the Venturer Jamboree "ADVenture14". We also unveiled a brand new Service Center for our Scouting Council which strongly promotes Scouting in our province.

We have seen our membership increase by six percent in comparison to the 2012-2013 year, giving us 2280 members. Along with this, we are also one of the top popcorn selling Councils in the whole country, something we should be extremely proud of! Our sales were up \$16,580 from last year with ninety-seven precent of our youth selling.

This has truly been an incredible year for our Council and it could not have happened without our amazing volunteers, youth members, and professional staff. Together we have delivered an amazing program which helps develop well rounded youth, better prepared for success in the world.

It is hard to believe that the 2013-2014 year has come and gone but what a year it has been.

We have experienced many changes and new developments nationally and locally. We have witnessed the unveiling of a new strategic plan and a complete revitalization of the Scouting program with "The Canadian Path". Along with that came a new online training platform "The David Huestis Learning Center" which proves to be much more user friendly. Locally we have a new Newfoundland and Labrador Service Center which is more accessible for our membership across the province.

Provincially, our Scouting Council has managed to grow six percent compared to the 2012-2013 year, giving us 2280 members.

Due partly to this membership growth, we are one of the top Councils for popcorn sales in the whole country, with our sales up \$16,580 from last year and ninety-seven precent of our youth are selling.

To top off an already exciting year our Council was fortunate enough to host the Venturer Jamboree "Journey to the Edge of the Earth: ADVenture14". Over 700 Scouters and Venturers, some traveling from as far as Saudi Arabia and Great Britain, came to Camp Nor' Wes to take part in the ADVenture.




Quality is an ongoing process that is recognized from time-to-time with a Quality Section Award and if we did nothing else but help each section attain this recognition, growth would be the result.

The Canadian Path

The Canadian Path is defined by its four key elements: Youth-led, Plan-Do-Review, Adventure and SPICES.

The Four Elements provide youth with the opportunity to play an active role in facilitating and creating their own Youth-Led Path and program. The Plan-Do-Review element creates a more engaged and reflective process for our members, which they can apply to all their Adventures and there will be many Adventures! SPICES will provide youth with a program that fosters well-rounded individuals, better prepared for success in the world.

This year Scouts Canada Groups embark on this new journey. It's going to be something special.



1

Youth-Led

Youth decide what activities they want to do, what adventures they want to undertake and what challenges they wish to give themselves. Youth bring their own ideas and interests to the mix to create Adventures in all six Program Areas so that the program truly becomes their own.

This does not mean that there is no Scouter involvement in the program, of course. Youth-led is not a free-for-all where anything goes while the adults stand back and watch. Our Scouters have an active role in mentoring, encouraging, guiding and inspiring the youth.

Plan-Do-Review

All Scouts and Scouters are involved in the planning process, brainstorming, making suggestions and providing input about the Program Areas they are interested in.

Everyone, Scouts and Scouters, are involved in the planned activities, and all youth are engaged and challenged in ways appropriate to their abilities.

It's important to include Review as part of the process of Scout activities, so Scouts can learn how to reflect upon their involvement and to determine how to revise or enhance future activities.



3

Adventure

Our youth have been asking for some new meaningful experiences, things that they will not experience at school. Let's help them get out and have those adventures.

The image of youth exploring in the wilderness is one of the first ideas that springs to mind when thinking about Scouting. Imagine Beaver Scouts catching fireflies at a local Scout camp, or Venturer Scouts taking a helicopter to a remote wilderness in the Rocky Mountains and hiking out. It's what many members of Scouting love about the program, and it's what compels a lot of people to come see what Scouting has to offer them.



SPICES

Social - Youth begin to understand how they depend on others, and how others depend on them. Scouting Adventures allow them to be part of a diverse group and develop cooperation and leadership skills.

Physical - Scouting Adventures provide many opportunities for youth to be responsible for the care and wellbeing of their bodies.

Intellectual - Youth have opportunities to develop in their ability to think, to plan, to innovate and to use information in an original way to adapt to new situations.

Character - Scouting Adventures guide youth to take responsibility for themselves while still respecting the needs of others, helping them to create a lifelong personal values system.

Emotional - Youth members are given opportunities to recognize and respect their own feelings and to learn to express them in a healthy manner while respecting the feelings of others.

Spiritual - Youth members have experiences in which they recognize that they are part of a larger spiritual reality and learn to respect the spiritual choices of others.

Scout Popcorn



Our sales during the 2013-2014 year were \$394,100. Which is \$16,580 more than 2012-2013.

The amount that went back to local scouting was \$237,706. That is \$13,285 more than previous years.

Group commission increased by \$22,895 this year compared to the 2012-2013 year.

The average sale per group increase from \$11,104 to \$12,421. That is \$1,317 more per group!


